SAFE SCUBA SYSTEM

Overview

Dive site selection is based on best dives available. Less experienced divers are given safety orientation dives to enable them to dive "red conditions". The Safe Scuba System (SSS) enables us to meet our Duty Of Care in matching each divers ability with the dive conditions according to the following table.

	Safe Dive Procedures	Each guest reads and signs the MBDE Save Diving Procedures plus completes a "dive history record".
1	Confidential Dive Status Discussion	Each guest has a confidential (husbands and wives separate) meeting with TD to review their dive history record. Review medical statement on booking form and ask if any medical or dive concerns. Each guests experience level is coded plus the safety orientations required are noted on the Safe Diving Procedures form. Please refer to page four re orientation dives.
	Experience Summary	During the above meeting the TD writes up the Dive Experience Summary. The orientations required are duplicated on another form which is shown to dive staff and posted on the dive deck.
	Coloured Tags	Showing divers experience level is attached to all divers cylinder valves prior to diving.
	Coloured Flags	Are flown to indicate dive conditions.
	Coloured Pens	Use green, yellow and red highlight pens to colour in guests name on dive log sheets.
	Red Risks	Each dive brief includes a safety caution. This identifies certain risk areas and mentally prepares the diver to avoid such difficulty.
	Red Weather	If red weather and on drift dives, must have lookout on alfresco deck with binoculars looking out 100% of time.
	Red Lookout Hat Orange Overcoat	Must be worn by lookout who is constantly surveying dive site, with pause less than 25 seconds.
	Trip Director	Arranges safety orientations for all green divers.
	Dive Masters	Monitor divers to ensure yellow and green divers receive cautions and orientations as per Safe Scuba System.
	Blind Spot	TD and Skipper must ensure area immediately in front of vessel which is hidden from lookout, is kept under observation and divers are cautioned that it's an out of bounds area.

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SAFE DIVING PROCEDURES AND AUTHORISATION

These safe diving procedures will maximise your diving safety.

- Novice divers must undertake safety orientation dives.
- 2. Each diver must assemble and check their own equipment to ascertain its good operating condition.
- 3. Plan each dive to be shallower than the previous dive, and within the no decompression limits of dive tables or computer.
- 4. Dive depth must be limited by your experience and training. We recommend less than 30m (100ft) especially on repetitive dives and a maximum depth of 40m (130ft).
- 5. Drink water before every dive to reduce risk of decompression sickness.
- 6. Do not drink alcohol until after your last dive of each day and then in moderation to ensure safe diving the next day. No Alcohol may be consumed less than 8 hrs prior to diving. No illegal drugs must be taken.
- 7. Slowly ascend from every dive. Recommend less than 9m (30ft) per minute.
- 8. Pay attention to the control of buoyancy and BCD on ascent.
- 9. Complete a 5 min. safety stop at 5m (16ft) on every dive.
- 10. If you are feeling unwell after a dive, or at any time, tell a staff member and lie down flat. Do not sit up or allow anyone to sit you up.
- 11. Multiple dives over multiple days can have an accumulative effect in contributing to decompression sickness. Every 3rd or 4th day make fewer dives. If you do 4 - 5 dives one day, do less the next. On the final day reduce bottom times and increase safety stop times.
- 12. I understand that diving is potentially dangerous. I fully accept that risk and agree to pay any medical, vessel relocation or evacuation costs incurred on my behalf and you are authorised to make medical and transport arrangements as may be determined to be necessary or desirable in my interests.

repeated until adequate skills are displayed.

Staff Orientation dives can only be conducted by paid, insured MBDE dive staff, NOT EXPEDITION CREW!

Assessment Guide Orientation dives can be combined with an Advanced class however must comply with all orientation requirements. Divers without an Advanced Certification or 15 dives are required to do a safety

orientation on their first reef, night and wreck dive. Divers who have not done 5 dives in last 12 months require a reef/wreck

orientation.

Divers who request help, lack confidence or are out of condition through age or fitness should do a reef/wreck orientation

Divers who can't prove certification (are certified but don't have card or not practical to contact original instructor) require a reef/wreck orientation

Divers who have not dived at night require a night orientation.

- Japanese divers with less than 50 dives (100 logged dives if Sport Tours booking) - every dive an orientation.
- * Japanese divers with 50 logged dives or Divemaster certified require orientation for first reef, night and wreck dive. When is the wreck orientation not required? If conditions at wreck are no more challenging than on reef orientation already completed.

Plus Open Water certified must be supervised on all night dives. Orientations are supplied on all dives, if that is diver's preference.

* This policy applies to Japanese divers booked from Japan plus those with poor English language skills if no Japanese dive staff onboard. Japanese divers trained and booked in Australia (with good English skills) are treated as normal.

Procedure

Using the above information as a guide during the "Confidential Dive Status" discussion, the TD records on passengers Safe Diving procedures form what orientations will be provided.

Note

Since we have been providing free safety orientations, more divers have been asking for a dive guide on the Yongala. It is important to tell divers that don't require the "safety orientations" that "safety orientations" are only provided to inexperienced divers.

"Site orientations", as opposed to "safety orientations" may be available depending on staff but underwater guides are not a normal aspect of our service.
